

JEFFERSON COUNTY EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND CHILD CARE REPORT 2017

In June 2017 there were 14 family child care homes in Jefferson County the same as in 2016 2 providers speak Spanish. None do over night or late shift care. One home is nationally accredited.

EDUCATION/TRAINING

Whenever possible, as with CDA certificates, data has been confirmed or obtained from certifying authorities. Most other education and training data has been obtained from the providers themselves. Almost all have SIDS/SBS prevention training.

FAMILY CHILD CARE BENEFITS

Family child care providers receive benefits predominately through contracts with their customers. The percentage listed is the percent of the providers surveyed in a category reporting that benefit.

HEALTH CARE: The number of providers that lack health insurance increased was 15%, decrease of 9% from 2016. 29% of the providers with health care receive it via a government program –all are on Obamacare. 29% have health care from being self-employed at their family child care home. The highest percentage (42%) still are insured through their spouses.

AVERAGE RATES JEFFERSON COUNTY FAMILY CHILD CARE HOMES

The first line in each rate category is the number of homes using that rate. Hourly rates are for <u>part-time</u> regular care. 33% of the providers do not accept Wisconsin Shares. In addition 84% of the providers will not accept the maximum reimbursement rate and require additional co-pays making their programs unaffordable to many families on Shares. 23% offer discounts for siblings, 77% offer no discounts or other financial assistance for parents. Rate changes were mixed this year. A lot of the changes were due to either fewer family child care homes or homes deciding to no longer offer some rate options. NA means not enough rates to analyze.

PARENTS PAYING FOR DAYS THEIR CHILDREN DO NOT ATTEND: Almost all of the child care providers have contracts that charge parents for time when their children are not in care. How they structure payments for those situations vary depending on whether the child is sick or on vacation. Some programs use an accrual process where days are accrued on a monthly basis. Others just set a flat number of days for the entire period covered by the contract. Virtually everybody who provided any type of sick or vacation day policy for children attending care only do it for children attending full time. There are no pro-rated options for families attending part time or on rotating schedules.

In terms of a sick child 80% just charge the full cost of care. 20% provide some sort of sick day policy – a set number of days where their parent will not be charged if the child is sick and not attending the family child care home-the average being 5 days. 50% charge parents when the family takes a vacation. The average number of days allotted without charge by the other providers is 6 days (most did either 5 or 10 days)
